I was so fond of that, that I painted a mural of it on an inside wall of the family barn/car shed. I was able to buy the spray paint myself—as a teenager—talk about nostalgia.

In the 1980s and 90s. The Reflector was largely filled with typewritten pages from the board and other clubs, and newspaper clippings photocopied for members to enjoy. At some point, a very enterprising edi-

tor. hand-colored the covers of several issues. As the current editor, I'm glad that hasn't become a regular practice. In four years, I've only hand-colored one or two issues: highlighting that it was time to renew your membership and A Christmas issue once when I had time to kill.



Fortunately for us editors, we shifted to email distribution and creating the issues in Microsoft Publisher back in 2011. That's allowed us to do fancy things including providing "hot"

links to email addresses and web addresses. Us being Carla Hibbard, Dean Barnat, and myself. Carla's work on *The Reflector* was exceptional and should have been recognized by MAFCA, but at least her editing of the SCRG's Regional Roundup won Best Regional Newsletter twice.

I first made words and photos "hot" links in the tech talk articles back in 2018 in an effort to improve the experience for members receiving their copies by email. Clicking them, you could watch a video, get a larger copy of the image, or read a complete article of which I was only quoting a small part.

The Lightbulb's Golden Anniversary

enry Ford, like many of us, was a collector. Starting as a child disassembling watches and other machines to see how they worked. As he built his collection of inventions, he stored them in a spare office in his factory as early as 1907. He didn't seem to think he had reached the critical mass necessary to install it in a museum until the late teens. Then planning for that building, as well as collecting for what to display, took an additional decade. Then Ford, rather than building replica rooms, began collecting famous buildings in addition to the machines built there. The first ones arriving in Dearborn in 1928 and they became the nexus of Greenfield Village.

The Henry Ford Museum complex—then to be known as *The Edison Institute*—broke ground September 27, 1928. The first roof rafters going up in May, 1929. The walls of the Independence Hall replica that fronts the main building, was completed in August.

Eventually, it would be ready to open to the general public on June 22, 1933, but Ford was excited about what he'd achieved already, and wanted to host a party as soon as things took shape.

The opportunity that presented itself that same year, was the Golden Anniversary

of the <u>first successful incandescent light</u> <u>bulb</u> invented by his longtime friend Thomas Edison on October 21, 1929.

The Edison Institute was dedicated by President Herbert Hoover with some 500 personal guests of Edison and Ford. It began with a program of the "history in the remaking" in person with Edison at the reconstruction of his Menlo Park laboratory. Followed by a tour of the historic buildings and finishing with a plush banquet afterwards in the Independence Hall replica. The attendees included Marie Curie, George Eastman, John D. Rockefeller, Will Rogers, Charles Schwab, Adolph Ochs, Walter Chrysler, J.P. Morgan, Orville Wright &, via shortwave radio from Berlin, Albert Einstein.

The reenactment was broadcast on radio with listeners encouraged to turn off their electric lights until the switch was flipped at the Museum.

This stunt was thought up by <u>Edward</u> <u>Bernays</u>, the father of modern public relations (see <u>Era Fashions August, 2021</u> about hair nets). The entire spectacle was his, an all-out PR assault that included not only the celebratory events mentioned above, but also included a commemorative US postage stamp.



The Omicron (discovered in South Africa), Delta (discovered in Maharashtra, India), Beta (previously South African Variant), and Alpha (previously called the London) variants, all travel a lot more than we have, these past 18 months.



Sadly, we're not over the virus dominating our lives, either. The graph above is from the Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation of past and anticipated Daily positive tests for COVID in the US from April 2020 to April 2022.

Last Christmas, just before the second lockdown, there were just under 600,000 positive tests per day. The IHME is predicting just under 3,000,000 per day in the month after Christmas this year. Good news is that California ICU vacancy, other than the San Joaquin Valley, has been running twice what is needed before declaring a lockdown order. Even weeks after Thanksgiving travel was 85% of what it was back in 2019.

A betting man would expect a two month lockdown with both the January and Feb-

Muffler Tail Pipe Clamp


ave you ever wondered why the exhaust manifold on a Model A becomes distorted and leaks after years of operation—why the outlet of the manifold is no longer vertical? That condition is not normal; manifolds were not always that way.

There is a reason for this and it is not just because of continuous heating and cooling. Many people installing the <u>muffler</u> will tighten the <u>clamp bolt</u> where it fastens the muffler/tail pipe to the frame, obviously to keep it from rattling.

This bolt is only supposed to be little more than hand tight. That is the reason for the castellated nut and cotter pin—so that the bolt will not become un-screwed and fall off. The reason for this is to allow the tail pipe to slide forward and backward when the exhaust system is heated and cooled alternatively. If the clamp is over-tightened the exhaust manifold actually bends when the muffler expands.

I found multiple videos on <u>installing new</u> <u>mufflers</u>, and none mention this, but *yes*, cast iron will 'bend' under these conditions. So remember, do not over-tighten your muffler/tail pipe clamp.

Jim's Technical Tip


LUBRICATING LOCKS

The best lubricant I have found for car door locks, trunk handle locks, and ignition locks, recommended by every locksmith that I know, is dry powdered graphite. You buy the



graphite in a small tube with a pointed tip. You insert the tip into the key hole and "puff" some graphite into the lock. Then you insert and remove the key several times to work the graphite into the lock tumblers, and operate the lock a few times.
