The original location opened in 2012 in historic downtown Fort Myers, less than a mile from Henry Ford's winter residence and it's quickly expanded to twenty locations, interesting potential franchisees with an average store volume of over five mil-

The twentieth location, which opened just this month, is in part of the old Le Blond Machine Tool Co. plant in Norwood, Ohio, just outside of Cincinnati.

Richard Knight Le Blond, founded the company in 1887 to manufacture metal lathes but also spindle drills and other milling machines. The Norwood facility was built in 1917, designed by the Cincinnati firm of Zettel and Rapp. It exemplified the "factory beautiful" school of industrial design. Designers took advantage of natural lighting, in addition to installing state-of-the -art electric lighting. Workers' locker rooms were equipped with showers and modern washrooms. Other amenities included an employee dining hall, an infirmary and a coffee-service area. The outside grounds resembled a park, complete with a lake, fountain, stone bridge and pavilion.

The restaurant has a collection of four Model A's, a '29 roadster, and '31 Victoria, SW Fordor, and steel topped AA. They even have an <u>online store</u> to buy trademarked clothing and accessories including a "craft milk" onesie for your infant and a bandana collar for your dog.

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

Grease Fitting Added to 7 Tooth Steering Gear

The drilled hole in the steering sector shaft, through which the lubricant in the steering gear housing was carried to the sector shaft bushings, has now been discontinued. Sector shaft bushings are now lubricated by means of a lubricator fitting placed in the steering gear housing. (See A, Fig 570) Lubricant should be forced into this fitting every 2,000 miles.

Should an instance arise where it is necessary to install the present design sector in an old steering gear assembly, it will be necessary to install a lubricator fitting in the housing. This is done by drilling a 21/64" hole 2-3/32" back from the center line of flange where housing is bolted to frame. (See Fig 571) The hole should be drilled through housing and sector bushing and then tapped with a standard 1/8" pipe tap. When tapping the hole do not tap too deep. The hole should be tapped just deep enough so that when the lubricator fitting is screwed down tightly approximately two threads on the fitting will remain above the surface of the housing. (See Fig 571)

You fill the steering gear box with the very heavy and thick 600W oil and you squirt a little grease into this fitting that you are adding. The grease will lubricate the sector shaft and it will form a little bit of a barrier that will slow down (not stop) the 600W gear oil from seeping out the sector shaft.






Blue Plate Special

If you look up the origin of the term *Blue Plate Special*, you will undoubtedly find it attributed to a menu for the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad restaurants, operated by Fred Harvey. It has even been "established" as being first printed on October 22, 1892 by Daniel Rogov.

That might be true, however, it appears very unlikely that the words used were intended at that time to identify a low-cost menu choice offered because the chef had plans to cook a large amount of that one item that day. Instead, as all of Fred Harvey's dishes were white with a blue chain pattern around the rims, and railroad car menus of 1892 did not have prices allowing diners to compare for value, if meals were referred to as a "blue plate special" it would have referred to absolutely everything which Fred Harvey offered.

The term as we understand it appears to come from roadside cafes springing up alongside the budding highway systems of the early 1920's in which, you might not recognize the best offerings at each restaurant, but you could recognize what each considered their best value. I theorize that rather than Fred Harvey—where everything was on an actual blue plate—the color blue was chosen because in the US, blue was the color distinguishing first place in county fairs. (Red was the color in Canada and the UK.)

In order to make this blue story fit with the golden theme for this anniversary volume of *The Reflector*, Fred Harvey's blue plates would have been served of the *Golden Gate Ltd.*: The passenger train between Oakland and Bakersfield on the ATSF, which, with the



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addition of bus service, provided transport between San Francisco and Los Angeles between 1938 and 1968.
