ANCESTORS IN ACTION



William Grabowsky married Rosa Fink and they emigrated from Prussia in 1861. The best evidence that William fought in the Civil War is that the couple had none of their seven children until daughter Lena in January 1866. Then in Detroit that September they had their second, Elizabeth "Libby". The next five children were all boys, Morris, Max, Joseph, Samuel, and Joshua.

At the turn of the century, William and Morris are merchants and Max works as a locksmith, gunsmith and bicycle repairman. In 1902, Max built a truck of his own design. It drove up to 10 m.p.h. powered by a horizontal gasoline engine. The chain-driven vehicle was sold to the American Garment Cleaning Company, one of the first recorded operators of a motor truck in Detroit. This first sale led to Grabowsky's forming the Grabowsky Motor Company (GMC).


Seventy-five GMC trucks were built and sold from 1902 through 1904 and, encouraged by this success, Grabowsky formally incorporated the *Rapid Motor Vehicle Company* with capitalization of \$13,000. Partners included his brother Morris and two saloon keepers from their synagogue, Barney Finn and Albert Marx. Brothers Joseph and Joshua also joined the company as employees.

In 1905 Grabowsky arranged for additional capitalization and production facilities with A. G. North and his Pontiac Spring and Wagon Works. In 1906 they built 200 trucks in 20 different models. In 1908, William Durant began buying shares and by 1909 his company, General Motors, had a controlling interest.

At that point, the brothers split to work for separate automobile interests. Max, went to the Kelsey Wheel Company, and eventually began selling real estate. Morris became president of the Alden Sampson Auto Company—which later became the Maxwell Car Company until 1925 when

it was bought by Walter Chrysler, and became a major part of Chrysler Motors.

The Southern California connection in this story is their older sister, Libby Grabowsky, who married fellow actor Porter J White in 1890 and toured the country. They moved to California after WWI where Libby taught acting and Porter sold insurance. Libby died in Pasadena in 1949. Libby's eldest grandson, Daniel Murnane, died May 6, 1942 in a Japanese POW camp in Manila.

Two William Boyds

William Henry Boyd and William Lawrence Boyd were both actors, but very different people. In 1929, there was a publicized "Battle of the Boyds" when William H Boyd moved to Hollywood to try his hand (face?) in movies. H had actually made movies five years earlier than L, in the New York studios of Solax Film Company and Realart. L made his movies in Hollywood from the start, and worked for the Cecil B DeMille Studios for a time. Pathe Studios, which owned the contract of William L Boyd, on September 20, 1930, agreed to credit him as Bill Boyd, somewhat at his objection. Whether that was 'the end' of it, is a topic for more research than I hope to do. Wikipedia says that crucial mistakes which effected their careers happened due to mistaken identity, but if you look simply at the movies they made, there is no proof to the statement.

Both actors were in action movies, beginning in the silent era. Neither in Westerns, but cops and finding treasure, and intrigue in far off foreign lands. They both made the transition to talkies and had reasonable success. William H Boyd's last movie before his death was The Lost City (1935) in which he played evil Dr. Zolok, intent on taking over the world using a machine that causes earthquakes. Bill Boyd shifted to mainly Westerns after the other's death securing the character of Hopalong Cassidy. Eventually, he was able to return to being billed as William Boyd, especially as before his death, William H Boyd began being billed as "William "Stage" Boyd" or just as "Stage Boyd" even. If you would like to see Stage Boyd act, you can watch the 1933 version of Oliver Twist, starring Dickie Moore, Boyd plays the evil Bill Sikes. Stage Boyd and evil characters seemed to go hand in hand, perhaps it was a bit of typecasting?

The first story I found of Stage Boyd's exploits outside of the stage occurred on August 14, 1920 when he got in a fight with Giants Manager, John McGraw hitting him over the head with a bottle in the Lamb's Club in Manhattan. Potential causes include that Stage Boyd backed British actors over Americans, and that McGraw was using foul language and Boyd told him to shut up as there were the cleaning ladies present. Odds are that the two were simply drunk out of their heads, but Prohibition had recently started and so they both politely insisted that everyone was sober, in fact the broken bottle was a water carafe in one story.





On January 18th, 1931 Stage Boyd's divorce from actress Clara Joel was finalized and he apparently was in **Oceanside** drinking to forget. On the 19th he sideswiped a car driven by Mrs. N. M. Jensen on the Coast Highway, forcing it into a ditch where it overturned. Then on February 28, 1931 Boyd was arrested at his home in Hollywood for throwing a wild party with drinking (still illegal) drugs, porn movies, and scantily clad female companionship. When interviewed, he claimed he was actually happy with the divorce because Miss Joel was "temperamental and often became abusive."

William L Boyd, made sure that Hopalong didn't smoke, drink, chew tobacco or swear, rarely kissed a girl and let the bad guy draw first. You couldn't come up with two more different guys.
